## Childcare service impacted by staff shortages

DONNYBROOK'S Treehouse Childcare Centre is facing a crisis point as it struggles to find staff, amidst the labour and housing shortages impacting many small businesses across Australia.

Centre director Jayde Wright said the childcare sector is one of the worst hit by labour shortages.

"Like most of Australia, we are struggling to find qualified childcare educators and have little success in enticing people into a career in childcare," she said.

"Currently our centre looks after 25 to 30 children per day, and we have a waiting list of at least 30 more children.

"Treehouse Childcare Centre has the physical capacity to accept more children per day; however, due to legislated requirements, staff-to-child ratios must be maintained."

Jayde said providing childcare in a rural location added extra strain, as there were only so many childcare educators who lived, or were prepared to work, in a small country town.

"To exacerbate the situation, if staff can be found, it is near impossible for them to move to Donnybrook due to our housing shortage.

"We are working tirelessly to find new educators to join our team, and we recently encouraged 'mature age' applicants to apply for a traineeship at the centre, with amazing results."

Jayde said she was working closely with other childcare centres in the area, as well as attending meetings with local members of parliament and speaking to the media, in an attempt to come up with a long-term solution to the shortage of childcare educators.

The Treehouse Childcare Centre is Donnybrook's only long daycare centre and has been operating for 25 years, supporting the growth and development of children while enabling parents and guardians to be a part of the local workforce.

Jayde said it was no surprise that Donnybrook attracted a growing population of young families, given its great facilities and schools, its proximity to Bunbury, good employment opportunities and a wonderfully warm and safe community.

"A key requirement for families these days is access to childcare, to enable families to earn enough money to combat the ever-increasing cost of living pressures being experienced.

"Childcare is also of huge benefit to young children, as it helps them to develop key social, emotional and communication skills that will set them up for life.

"Childcare centres, also known as early childhood education and care centres, employ highly-skilled and trained early childhood teachers and educators who provide individual learning programs," she said.

The Treehouse facility is a not-for-profit, community run organisation overseen by a volunteer management committee made up of local parents, and it relies on grants and donations to upgrade and maintain the centre and its facilities.

"We currently have several projects for which we are trying to raise funds, including building a bus shelter for our community bus, purchasing new child seats and installing more anchor points in the bus, purchasing and building a children's play fort, gardening and landscaping, driveway repairs and much more," Jayde said.

"We understand the huge need for childcare in our community and the impact current shortages are having on families and businesses, with employees not being able to return to work or take on new positions due to a lack of childcare options."

Jayde said people needed to be aware of the current circumstances faced by childcare providers and that the Treehouse Childcare Centre was doing everything it could to accommodate more Donnybrook families.

#### Local cherries to star at annual auction again

AT THE Annual Cherry Auction to be held in Perth on Friday 8 December 8, a five kilo box of Sweet Cherry Valley's cherries will again be a star attraction.

Donnybrook's Sweet Cherry Valley orchard has been a contributor to the cherry auction since 2005.

Its cherries, beautifully presented in a timber box made by Donnybrook Mens Shed, are the official prize cherries of the auction, so the winning bidder each year is crowned 'cherry king or queen'.

The proceeds always go to supporting the Perth Children's Hospital Foundation, and this year the auction will support the Rare Care Centre which improves awareness and early identification of children with potential diseases.

It is the 31st year of this unique auction with delicious cherries being freshly delivered from WA's South West orchards for the event.

Last year the cherry auction raised a record total of \$140,000, with the five kilo box of Sweet Cherry Valley cherries selling for \$49,000.

This year's timber box has been made from marri by Mens Shed member Phil Staniford.

It is the second box Phil has made for the auction, but the first he has made from marri timber.

"I made last year's box from jarrah, so this was different and it took a couple of weeks to make," said Phil.



#### Preparing pets for the bushfire season

DURING the fires in the Preston River valley last January, the Emergency Animal Support (in) Evacuation Western Australia (EASE WA) played an important role in supporting landowners to relocate their horses.

To help locals prepare for the 2023-2024 fire season, the Lowden Fire Brigade invited Dusty Murray, the Founder of EASE WA, to share what she has learnt from 13 years of evacuating pets and livestock across Western Australia.

At a workshop held recently, Dusty reinforced the importance of having a plan and practising it.

She said a good starting point was ensuring that pets and livestock are properly identified with a name tag or microchip, and that the stock registers for livestock are current.

The shire ranger at the meeting also highlighted doing this, as clear identification makes it possible for displaced stock and pets to find their way back to their owners.

"The best way to protect your pet is to move them to a safer area in advance, and train your pet to do what you need them to do in an emergency situation," Dusty said. She also reinforced knowing what your personal trigger is for evacuating with your pets.

The bushfire warning updates provided by Emergency WA can help with this.

Dusty brought along a range of evacuation kits for different types of animals, which she tailors to each type of pet's needs.

Wheelie bins are recommended for bigger animals as they are easy to move and can be used to carry hay or get water.

Items placed in the bins included feed and water buckets, a halter, fly veil, first aid kit, feed scoop and hay net for the animals, and a hi-vis vest and goggles for their owners.

Lowden Fire Brigade will be offering another Bushfire Ready session on Sunday 3 December, from 10am to 11.30am at the Yabberup Hall, which will provide an opportunity for children and young people to come together with those they live with, to plan and practise their Bushfire Ready plans.

#### Book records hard toil to make olive oil

STORIES of the Italian tradition of growing olives and making olive oil in the Balingup-Mullalyup area have been included in a recently released book Olives, Oil & Toil.

Compiled by Maggie Edmonds and launched at the annual WA Olive Awards night held in the Swan Valley on Saturday 21 October, the book records the first 25 years of the modern olive industry in WA from 1995 to 2020.

Donnybrook resident Vienna Radovic's account of her brother, Paul, designing and making an olive oil press for their father, Abbandonati Vittorio, in Mullalyup in 1941, has been included in the book.

Vienna said she initially wrote about their family's olive growing and oil making traditions for the Balingup Historical Project Group's Italian migrant exhibition held in Balingup's Packing Shed last year.

"My father, who was always known as Oll & 10 Vittorio, came to Australia from Italy in 1927, and my mother and Paul joined him in Mullalyup in 1936," she said.

"Vittorio and Paul's invention of the amazing olive crusher and their production of olive oil enabled them to share their special homemade olive oil with friends.

"Vittorio was known throughout the South West for his famous olive oil, which has held a special place in our family."

Vienna recalls that olive trees were scarce at the time, and although Vittorio had planted several olive trees on his Mullallyup property, he often went in search of extra olives to press due to the large amount of fruit needed to make oil.

"The olives must be black and ripe for oil making and I remember a long slow trip in the old truck to Picton with Vittorio and my two sisters to pick olives," she said.

"It was a hard, long, tiring day, down on our knees picking up the olives from the ground until late afternoon, packing up the fruit and then the long, slow journey home.

In Olives, Oil & Toil, Vienna explains the complex and slightly dangerous process of making olive oil using Paul's invention.

"As the olives were fed by hand into the mincing machine, fingers were at risk and caution had to be taken at all times," she said.

"We had many visitors to Mullalyup from near and far to taste the olive oil and to inspect our press.

"Many attempts were made to copy it, but all failed – it was never successfully copied by others."

Proceeds from the sale of Olives, Oil & Toil will go towards a project directed by Professor Stan Kailis to spread the word to consumers about the health benefits of olive oil, table olives and olive leaf tea. ## Mens Shed receive further funding for router project

ADDITIONAL funding from the Donnybrook Community Bank has enabled members of the Donnybrook Mens Shed to further enhance the use of its computer numerically controlled (CNC) router.

Initial funding by Westpine Industries allowed the Mens Shed to acquire the router which was designed, built, programmed and tested by members and took a year to complete.

Florio De Re said more funding was needed to upgrade the components of the router, so the group applied for funds at the Donnybrook Community Bank's annual Pitch Night.

"Donnybrook Mens Shed received a donation of \$8,000 for which we thank them very much," he said. Bank manager David Barkle attended the Mens Shed on Friday 17 November, to see how the router worked.

"We are always happy to support the community and on seeing the demonstration of the router, I am very impressed with how it works," David said.

Florio said the router enables members to design and create objects using the latest technology.

"The router enables the Mens Shed to offer more inclusive activities, so if a member is unable to use one of our more traditional machines due to disability, they may be able to use this router," he said.

#### Donnybrook RSL remembers fallen heroes

ON REMEMBRANCE Day each year, Australia and countries all over the world, stop on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month, to remember those whose lives were sacrificed in war.

This year in Donnybrook, on Saturday 11 November, a small crowd gathered at the war memorial on South Western Highway.

The thoughts of those people who attended were on the past and, perhaps, of relatives who were among those who never came home.

Many of those who did return from war had suffered physically and mentally from what they had been through, and some were never to be the same again. Julie King and Geoff Box had placed 100 white crosses, each adorned with a red poppy, in the gardens either side of the war memorial at 5.30am, as they do each year.

The memory and acknowledgement of the animals that were sacrificed during war were also recognised by purple poppies.

President of the Donnybrook branch of the RSL, Ric Evans, welcomed and thanked all in attendance.

The Ode was read at 11am and after the first note of The Last Post was sounded, the flag was lowered to half mast.

A minute's silence followed and after the Rouse, flag was once again raised to the dot of the masthead.



#### U3A members learn to read the night sky

AT THE November meeting of the Donnybrook U3A (University of the Third Age) members were treated to a lesson on reading the night sky.

Friday 17 November turned out to be the perfect night for stargazing, with a group of members gathering on the oval at St Mary's Primary School, Donnybrook.

Scott Pickering and Tracy Humphreys, both of Donnybrook, were brimming with enthusiasm and knowledge about their astronomic hobby.

We were introduced to the different types of telescopes and the different functions of each.

Although we could see the waxing moon with the naked eye, by observing through the telescope we could see the shaded areas of the moon and all its craters.

November is one of the few times you can see both Orion and Scorpio together in the early evening, so we were able to see

Orion slowly rise from the east as Scorpio lowered to the west.

At this time of year, the Southern Cross is very low on the horizon so we were unable to see it through the trees, but Jupiter and Saturn were clearly visible.

Our amateur astronomers also pointed out the milky way that, through the telescope was a mass of tiny stars, and all the different signs of the zodiac - it was absolutely fascinating!

Several satellites were seen shooting through the sky and we also learnt that there are two fully operational space stations in orbit: the international space station and the Chinese space station 'Tiangong'.

We all walked away from our experience thirsting for more and admiring Scott's and Tracy's enthusiasm.

U3A will not be having another guest speaker until February, but we will hopefully meet in January for a meal. This year we have been so lucky to have such a diverse range of topics, with people giving up their time to join us.

## Who are Alan Walker and Philippa Ahrens? BY SARAH HORNSEY

#### Introducing a devoted couple with an adventurous past

FAMED 19th century writer and liberal thinker, Ralph Waldo Emerson said "people destined to meet will do so, apparently by chance, at precisely the right moment" and this seems to be the case for Alan Walker and Philippa Ahrens.

The pair met some 34 years ago when Alan sailed into Port Douglas and asked around for work.

He was told to speak to 'the boss' who turned out to be Philippa, a civil engineer, registered builder and architect who was running a group of motel units that she had built there.

She did not have any work for him, but they hit it off immediately as she was also a keen sailor.

"We just clicked," said Alan, and it seemed that all the stars aligned as Alan's birthday is July 27, Philippa's is July 28 and they met on July 29.

They have been together ever since.

Even so, they are strong and independent individuals and each had their own interesting back story, of course. Philippa came from England when she was three years-old with her parents and older sister, when her father set up a GP practice in Melbourne.

The family paid their way to Australia, father arriving by ship first. Then Philippa, her sister and mother travelled by flying boat, a popular mode of transport in the inter-war period, because they could land on water instead of expensive land-based runways.

Philippa was educated in Melbourne and then attended Melbourne University to complete a degree in civil engineering, which was an unusual profession for a woman in those days

During the next decade or so, she lived in Germany, learnt to speak the language and married a German man.

Her son, David, was born in Germany and younger daughter, Heidi, was born on their return to Melbourne.

When the marriage ended, Philippa built and ran a set of motel units in Port Douglas.

Alan was born at King Edward Hospital in Perth.

His maternal grandmother was from England and his grandfather took up a parcel of land in Cowaramup, under the soldier settlement scheme just after the First World War.

His father's family came from the Ballarat region and settled in the goldfields around Kalgoorlie.

Alan was one of five kids, and due to his father suffering with post-war trauma and alcohol abuse, the eldest three children were sent to children's homes in the 1960s.

Alan lived for a time at Benmore Presbyterian Children's Home in Caversham, a working dairy farm, until he was 13.

He remembers being freezing in the winter and always having bare feet except to go to church on Sunday - and the peculiar joy of stepping in a fresh cow pat to warm the feet on those icy days.

Later he got a job with a butcher, who paid him five pounds a year and deducted three pounds for board.

He learned valuable butchery skills in this job, starting when he accompanied the butcher out to the farm to slaughter the cattle, and he learnt to use every part of the animal, down to feeding the remnants to the pigs.

Following advice from a neighbour, he soon travelled up north to work as a roustabout with the big shearing teams.

He was a single man and had no-one waiting for him back home, but he now contemplates, with a shake of his head, the married men who were away from home from mid-January to mid-December each year, leaving their wives and families behind.

Alan also worked at sea on cray fishing boats in the northern waters.

In time, he got married and three children followed, his sons Alan and Clint and a daughter, Kim.

Back in Perth, he completed a bricklaying course at Midland Brick, then worked as a bricklayer for the next 30-odd years, building his own home at Quindalup over 15 years of weekends, and often travelling to remote locations such as New Caledonia and New Guinea building brick furnaces to earn an income.

Inspired by the travels of Dutch-Australian adventurer and film maker, Alby Mangles, Alan and family bought a boat in Queensland and set off on a sailing adventure.

After this odyssey, he and his wife separated. Then he sailed into Port Douglas, where he met Philippa.

Around 1972 Alan and a mate had started a bagpipe band in Busselton.

In fact, he recalls being a member of the Busselton Pipe Band when they led the Apple Festival floats down the main street of Donnybrook around this time.

At the Sheridan Hotel in Port Douglas, he played the bagpipes for 400 Japanese visitors on New Year's Eve and recalls causing a stir in the remote islands of New Guinea by playing the bagpipes at sunset.

The inquisitive locals took to their canoes to investigate this curious caterwauling.

On another occasion, he was asked to pipe in the haggis for a Scottish celebration in the highlands – but this was the highlands of New Guinea!

"I have had so much fun with the bagpipes all over the world," he said.

Two years after they met, Alan, Philippa and her nineyear-old daughter, Heidi, set off to circumnavigate the world.

The 16-year sea journey, which took in more than 62 countries and involved adventures and danger on the high seas, was extraordinary but, when one meets Alan and Philippa, it is not difficult to imagine this resourceful and resilient couple choosing 'the road less travelled'.

Philippa meticulously kept a daily diary and has since written a 600-page book which chronicles their remarkable ocean voyages.

With open hearts and minds, they sailed into unfamiliar territory, thinking on their feet and learning with every passing day, and responding to unfamiliar opportunities, challenges and new experiences as best they could.

They became involved in the local scene, were willing to do whatever was needed, and found that by engaging with and working among the locals, they were accepted and invited to participate in many community events that normally would not have been shared with them.

They met good and bad people from every culture. "These are experiences that broaden your horizons," Alan said.

"So often people don't step outside of their community.
"They are blinkered, and yet they form strong opinions about what is going on, in another part of the world.

"They become intolerant and, sometimes, they are just wrong," he said.

Alan and Philippa met many generous souls who helped them and invited them into their homes, and they also saw drug and people smuggling operations.

They were caught in a Category 5 hurricane and there were times when they were cheated and even captured by pirates.

"We knew we were going to encounter trouble somewhere along the way, because we'd stick our noses into all the little docks and interesting places, but that's where the adventure lies," Alan said.

"You just have to take it as it comes," Philippa added. "Was it difficult to be in the confined space of the boat for so long?" I asked.

"Confined? What do you mean?" asked Philippa.

"There's the whole ocean!" she said.

"And think of the changing views every day," Alan added.

After their years at sea, Alan and Philippa returned to Cairns

They put the boat on the market and spent around three years painstakingly building their own home in Queensland's picturesque Tin Can Bay.

However, with some of their five children and twelve grandchildren now settled in the Shire of Donnybrook-Balingup, they later bought five acres at Kirup and again set to building a large home using mainly reclaimed materials as they came upon them over about four years.

Then they downsized to a small house in Donnybrook, with just what they need, and they have lived there for just over two years.

Around this time, Philippa's health began to deteriorate and the couple's latest stage of life represents the next challenge for this irrepressible and devoted couple.

Alan said that Philippa has been a beautiful partner – loyal, with a lovely nature.

"I just love her to bits," he said.

Then he talks about how she outperformed him in the man-overboard manoeuvre during their skipper's ticket exam before they left Port Douglas, and he tells me that their first frightening encounter with pirates was only three months into their journey.

"Philippa barely flinched or batted an eyelid," he said with admiration.

"Well, you have just got to get on with it - what else are you going to do?" Philippa says, brushing it off with her typical pragmatism.

"I'm just glad we survived," Alan said, "we have had a certain amount of luck, that's for sure."

Writer and thinker Ralph Emmerson Palmer also said "our greatest glory is not in never failing, but in rising up every time we fail".

This adventurous couple is courageous and supportive partners in life, who may not know what lies around the next bend, or over the next wave, but who have learned to take a practical approach and deal with whatever challenges come along as best they can.

"No regrets," said Alan. "None."

As we bid farewell to another year, 2023 has been marked by significant milestones at the Greenbushes Lithium Operation (Mine).

#### Highlights include:

- we commenced construction on Chemical Grade Plant #3 (CGP3);
- we released Talison's inaugural Sustainability Report;
- we are on track to achieve a new production record for the Mine of approximately 1.5 million tonnes of spodumene concentrate;
- we are on track to achieve a new material movement for the Mine in excess of eight (8) million bank cubic metres (bcm);
- we commenced a detailed feasibility study (**DFS**) into the potential recommissioning of the Greenbushes to Bunbury Rail line in partnership with the State Government;
- we commissioned a new Temporary Accommodation Camp;
- we commenced construction of a Permanent Accommodation Village;
- we completed construction of a new Mine Services Area (MSA); and
- we continued to expand the mining operations with the commencement of new mine services contractor (Macmahons).

Additionally, we proudly unveiled our new Community Investment Program (CIP). The CIP provides substantial funding for strategic programs that aim to boost social capital and stronger communities. This involves collaboration with a wide range of stakeholders, such as not-for-profit community groups, local government and education/training providers.

In the first tranche of CIP funding announced during the year, Talison was proud to allocate \$3 million funding for the Donnybrook VC Mitchell Park project, which promises to rejuvenate sport and recreation facilities, delivering social, health and economic benefits to the Shire of Donnybrook Balingup and the broader Southwest region.

Talison also provided \$29,826 in sponsorship and donations to local Donnybrook Balingup community groups, coupled with \$9,000 in scholarships to schools within the Shire of Donnybrook Balingup.

As December unfolds, we will see the successful completion of the one-year traineeship program for our 2023 Trainees and welcome the 2024 Trainees and Apprentices. It has been great to follow the growth and development of our 2023 Trainees, and we eagerly anticipate the positive impact our 2024 Trainees will make at the Mine.

Talison is committed to creating a sustainable workplace that benefits both its employees and surrounding communities. Talison recognises the high demand for workers in the region and is committed to minimising the impact of its operations on key areas such as accommodation and hospitality. We are actively trying to find the balance between hiring locally and preserving the liveability of local communities and are focused on finding innovative solutions to address the shortage of accommodation and attract the best talent to our workforce.

This is why, in 2024 Talison will begin to transition towards a dual residential/drive-in-drive-out (DIDO) workforce to attract the right talent whilst also striving to preserve the unique character and liveability of local communities. I look forward to providing you with updates on this transition in the new year.

Lastly the work we do each day at the Mine is helping create a better tomorrow by supplying the lithium needed for the global transition to cleaner energy. 
## Best wishes to new councillors

Given that we do so many jobs every day, there is a lot of potential to improve your day.


Bringing your mind to the current moment also improves stress levels and anxiety.

#### Green corridors essential for wildlife survival

AUSTRALIANS love building fences.

We have the longest fences in the world.

In Western Australia, we have 3,300 kilometres of the "rabbit-proof fence", and there is 5,600 kilometres of the "dingo fence" in south-eastern Australia.

We build them around our houses, industrial complexes, mining sites, paddocks and anywhere we want to keep anything in or out.

Australians also love building roads.

There always seems to be a sound and logical reason to build another road or widen the ones we have.

And then there is the wildlife.

How does the introduction of these two formidable obstacles impact on their survival?

Barriers such as fences and roads cause disruption in the natural movement of many species to and from their traditional spaces.

No longer the open picket fence, swampy land or endless treetop canopies providing access to water sources, food supplies and nesting grounds for our water birds, marsupials, reptiles and amphibians.

We don't have to drive far to see the fauna collision

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fatalities of an ever-increasing number of vehicles on our expanding road system.

Human activities on the environment constantly challenge the human-wildlife interaction balance and adds continuing weight to the importance of green corridors and habitat connectivity to protect our valuable natural assets.

Green corridors are connectors of habitat that have been isolated or fragmented because of human activities or structures.

These corridors prevent in-breeding, which can lead to local extinctions, by aiding genetic diversity, and they contribute to population renewal following bushfire, allow natural migrations and provide food resources by maintaining flora biodiversity.

One important green corridor opportunity is our roadside verge reserve, especially in regional areas

Australian road verges are often overlooked for their value, so tend to be cleared and burned allowing invasive weeds to establish.

However, they are responsible for maintaining up to fifty per cent of our wildflower species and endangered flora and provide that important linkage to larger areas of vegetation, so protection not removal, is needed.

Railway reserves, sporting grounds, golf courses and local reserves, creek lines and rivers are more possibilities for creating green corridors, as are our backyards.

We only have to use Google to get a birdseye view of the gaping holes in our vegetation connectivity.

So, this festive holiday season take some time out to think of ways you can create a wildlife corridor in your space and enrich your life with nature. Merry Christmas everyone.

#### **Community vital to Preston River foreshore success**

The project, now in its third year, focused has fostering community involvement, managing invasive species, and creating habitat native wildlife along

Community works kicked off in May this year with a busy bee, preparing the groundwork for what would become a series of succesful events throughout the year.

Over 2,000 seedlings were planted this year alone, with four community planting days, including two with eager students from Donnybrook District High School and Bunbury Cathedral Grammar School.

In October, the community came together for a bat box building workshop and night walk.

The workshop not only resulted in the creation of bat boxes to be installed along the river, but also deepened participants' connection with the local wildlife, as they witnessed the wide variety of fauna that call the foreshore home.

A big thank to the Donnybrook Lions Club for fueling the hard work of our volunteers at all of our events this year with delicious sausage sizzles.

The Lions Club has been a massive supporter of the conservation efforts along the Preston River and continue to provide support to the project, including funding three possum drey building workshops to be held next year.

We would like to thank the members of the Donnybrook Football Club (DFC), whose dedication saw them augering holes prior to planting with equipment generously provided by Bangadang Farm.

Thanks also to Bill and Neville from DFC for engaging with the Thomson Brook Volunteer Fire Brigade to assist in watering the seedlings over summer.

#### What's Next?

The commitment to the foreshore revegetation does not end with planting.

The LCC's Danju team and the Thomson Brook Volunteer Fire Brigade will play a crucial role in post-planting care, diligently mulching the seedlings and implementing watering sessions over summer to ensure their survival.

If you have noticed some bare areas along the foreshore, these are sites which are under active weed management aiming to reduce the significant

invasion of watsonia (Watsonia bulbilifera) and giant reed (Arundo donax) along the riverbank.

Works will continue over the next few years to ensure that the planned revegetation in these areas will have the best chance of survival.

Whilst these works are being undertaken, we ask that you please keep to the designated tracks to avoid risk of personal injury and reduce the risk of damaging the riverbanks.

There is plenty more planned for the foreshore in 2024 including community plantings and exciting workshops. Be sure to sign up to the LCC mailing list at https://www.leschenaultcc.org.au/contact so you don't miss out.

Once again, we thank all our volunteers and supporters that have enabled the Preston River Foreshore Revitilisation program to continue to grow from strength to strength, in particular: the WA Government's NRM Program, the Shire of Donnybrook-Balingup, the Donnybrook Lions Club, Talison Lithium Ltd, the Donnybrook Football Club, the Leschenault Biosecurity Group Inc, Donnybrook Butchers, Café Tiffany's, traditional custodians, the Donnybrook Scout Group, the Preston Press, the Bunbury Regional Prison's Pre-Release Unit, Bangadang Farm, Donnybrook Fresh Donnybrook-Balingup Community Radio, the Lowden and Thomson Brook Volunteer Bush Fire Brigades, Donnybrook District High School, Bunbury Cathedral Grammar School, and the many individuals that have selflessly volunteered their time and expertise. #### What quantities of micro-plastics are in our ocean?

WE OFTEN hear concerns raised about micro-plastics and I was flabbergasted to read the following pieces of research recently.

ABC identity Dr Karl posted a social media video in September on micro-plastics.

In it, he cites a 2021 study that showed micro-plastics are present in the placentas of babies just born and suggestions that Australians consume between five and 250 grams of plastic each year.

In Greta Thunburg's *The Climate Book*, one of the authors highlights research that points out that if governments stick to existing commitments to plastics, by 2030, there will be a reduction in plastic waste of eight per cent.

These specific pieces of information stood out to me, amongst an ocean of others.

Inspired by a friend's university assignment, I wanted to see about testing our local waters to answer 'what do we discharge into the ocean?'

So, on a day I was at home with my daughter, we made a trip to Bunbury's 5 Mile Brook.

I scooped up 20 litres of water in barrels, took the water home, strained it, and then looked at it using a cheap plastic microscope from Kmart.

Being honest, I couldn't work out what I was looking at, so my attempts thus far have simply drawn a blank. I have no idea what this region is putting out into the ocean.

Perhaps my next question is, does anyone know?

I only know that I still get lazy and use take away coffee cups, and I wonder how many grams of plastic I consume in a year.

## Nesting turtles at risk

TURTLE nesting season is underway, but unfortunately many are run over by cars or succumb to predators while moving to dry land to nest.

The Leschenault Catchment Council and the Friends of Big Swamp are asking people to keep an eye out for snake-necked turtles, and to slow down.

Please remember, if a turtle is seen leaving the water, do not approach it. Turtles are easily startled and will return to the water, and not nest, if they are spooked.

If you would like to report a nesting turtle, please contact the Leschenault Catchment Council on 0458 960 576 and the Bunbury Turtle Trackers will be notified.

The turtle tracking program for this year is almost finished; however, if you are interested in joining Turtle Trackers next nesting season, get in touch.

The more citizen scientists we have monitoring the Big Swamp during nesting season the more we can do to protect this at risk species.

# **All the Christmas trappings**

#### The 2023-24 season has started!

In time for Christmas, a 3000+ trap array has been set across Perth and regional sites in WA. Their purpose? To detect the invasive European wasp (*Vespula germanica*); one of the world's worst insect pests.

These gluttonous wasps swarm picnics, parties, cafés, and breweries, feeding on all things; drinks, sweets, and savories. Watch them close enough and you'll see their jaws skilfully carve a piece from your meal and take it to go. This behaviour makes them unique amongst wasp species and a social nuisance and safety concern.

European wasps also forage on fruit crops, impacting home gardeners and commercial producers, and their predation of insects can impact local biodiversity and beehives. When it comes to destructive pests, they take the cake.

The Department-lead European wasp surveillance and eradication program, has to date, prevented the permanent establishment of this species. However, every year fertilised queens hitchhike into WA on vehicles or in freight and cargo from interstate. If undetected, they will leave their mode of transport and make a nest, which is predominantly underground.

Manually searching for a nest, is like looking for a needle in a haystack. The traps help us locate where in this haystack we need to look.

The traps are simple, but cleverly designed. Composed of a clear plastic, lidded jar, wire hook, a yellow label, and four specially designed yellow cones. A trap typically adorns a tree, and the decorative yellow appeals to the wasp, drawing them to the cones. The cones funnel the wasp inside and make it difficult to escape.

Capitalising on the wasps' unique attraction to protein, present inside the trap is a small cube of raw fish. It's this fish that lures the wasp to the trap. If a trap doesn't contain the fish, it's just a plastic ornament.

Traps are strategically placed in the highest risk areas of the state by surveillance staff or hung in home gardens, parks or schools by community or government participants of the 'Adopt-a-trap' program. If diligently lured with fish (fortnightly) and checked for wasps, we'll detect them, find them, and eradicate them.

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#### Was the book better than the movie?

BOOKS made into movies were explored by Donnybrook Page Turners book club in October and this is what everyone found:

All The Light We Cannot See, by Anthony Doerr, is a Pultizer Prize winning story about hope and resistance.

The author swaps timelines in an engaging manner focusing on the story of two teenagers during World War II, one is a blind girl in Nazi-occupied France, the other a German orphan boy in the Nazi army.

The movie version was recently released on Netflix, and if it sounds familiar, that is because it is a popular book for Page Turner members.

The Bridges of Madison County, by Robert James Waller, was published in 1992 and this bestselling novel became a well-loved film in 1995, with its stars Clint Eastwood and Meryl Streep.

The story of Robert Kincaid, the photographer searching for covered bridges in Madison County, and Francesca Johnson, the farmer's wife waiting for the fulfillment of a girlhood dream.

And Then There Were None, by Agatha Christie, is a mystery novel published in 1939 by this famous English author who described it as her most difficult book to write.



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Ten strangers are invited to stay on an isolated island near the Devon coast, where they are cut off from the mainland and their hosts are mysteriously absent.

When one stranger suddenly dies, they realise the killer is among them and is preparing to kill them all one-by-one.

The novel is an enjoyable read that was turned in to a movie in 1945 and a mini series in 2015, but disappointingly, the movie has a different ending to the book.

Little Women, by Louisa May Alcott, was published in 1868 and set during the American Civil War.

It is the story of the March family, principally the four girls: Meg, Jo, Beth, and Amy.

The girls who struggle and grow as a family while their father is serving in the war, learn the value of hard-work, self-sacrifice, and love.

There have been seven film adaptations of this well-loved novel, the latest version was released in 2019 and is available on Netflix.

Still Life, by Noel Coward, is a play written in 1936 portraying a touching romance that was the basis for the 1945 hit film *Brief Encounter*.

After meeting and falling in love in a suburban railway station, Dr Harvey and Laura meet weekly before realizing they must part forever. It is a slow burning romance between two people who are fated to never be together.

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
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# Winter golf finishes as bowls competition heats up
