Balingup Primary commemorates the ANZAC Day

RETURNED serviceman Bob Atkins was guest of honour at the Balingup Primary School's ANZAC Day assembly held on Wednesday 24 April.

Bob, who joined the navy in 1962 at the age of 17, talked about his medals to the students, which include an Australian Active Service medal, earned in Malaysia and Vietnam, a War Service medal for Borneo, the Far East Strategic Service medal, the Australian Defence medal, and the Logistic Support Forces Vietnam. This medal recognises the three trips Bob made escorting the aircraft carrier HMAS

equipment from 1963 to 1967. Bob's presence at the assembly was a reminder of the valour and sacrifices made by many in service to our nation.

Shire faces \$1 million funding shortfall for assets

THE Shire of Donnybrook-Balingup is facing a \$1.03 million funding gap in relation to its asset management, that has the potential to grow to \$1.7 million in seven years.

Dr Garry Hunt, temporary Shire chief executive officer, advised the Shire Council at its agenda briefing session held on Wednesday 17 April that the Council faced some tough decisions over the management of its asset portfolio.

Dr Hunt said if the Council did not address the issue of lack of asset renewal, it had the potential to eat away at the Shire's financial foundation.

"I fear for this community because if you don't start putting some money away, and, like any investment or savings account, if you don't put anything in, then it just compounds," he said.

"You need that much, plus what you didn't put in, and it keeps going on and on."

Dr Hunt said asset management was an issue that

often got lost in the budget conversations of smaller local governments, as the focus tended to be on rates.

"Asset rationalisation is one process — what do you really need? Can you do something about reducing the amount of depreciation you are incurring, and reduce the amount of maintenance you are incurring?"

Dr Hunt said some conversation was needed in the upcoming budget workshops about what was more important in terms of some of the things the community wants, or maintaining and looking after the Shire's long term assets.

Shire president Vivienne MacCarthy said the Shire's 2024-25 asset management plans, reserve fund plan, borrowings plan and ratings objectives strategy serve as 'informing strategies'.

"They play a crucial role in helping councillors understand the decisions we face, especially as we approach the annual budget process," Cr MacCarthy said. Continued on page 3

Shire Council faces tough decisions on assets

SHIRE president Vivienne MacCarthy said these plans were considered in line with expectations set out in the Shire's Community Strategic Plan.

"With a total asset valuation of \$335m, these informing strategies highlight an initial funding gap of \$1.03 million, growing to \$1.7 million in seven years," she said.

"During the April ordinary council meeting, councillors will respond to an Executive recommendation to request the chief executive officer to use the 2024/25 Asset Management Plan and supporting plans, to inform and guide development of the long-term financial plan and the annual budget.

"The long-term financial plan will be presented to Council at the June ordinary council meeting.

"Now, our community, councillors and Shire executive each have a role to play in working together to identify opportunities to close the funding gap and ensure continuity in the level of amenity that we and future generations enjoy from our assets," she said.

The Shire of Donnybrook-Balingup's asset portfolio is valued at a total replacement value of \$335 million and is made up of 41 lots of freehold land, 134 buildings, 56 vehicles, 634.50km of roads, 35 bridges, 23 kms of drainage pipes, 27 km of footpaths and 614 items of equipment at parks and reserves.

At the agenda briefing meeting held on 17 April, the Shire's finance projects manager Stuart Eaton said there had been a lack of asset renewal on the Council's asset portfolio.

"The Council has a third of a billion dollars of assets and the budget is not structurally funding that level of assets," he said.

"Until such time that it does, the long-term implementations are of asset decline to a point of failure."

Mr Eaton said the type of failure likely to occur was determined by different things, and could result in a preventative failure, where an asset was closed, or an emergency failure where a roof fell in or a lighting pole fell over.

Dr Hunt said as the Shire's budget workshops progress, Council would need to start to identify the assets it wanted to keep along with the assets that spending money on was not value for money in the short or long term.

Finance director resigns

Kim Dolzadelli, Director of Finance and Corporate Services, has resigned from the Shire, as of 26 April. Mr Kim Dolzadelli joined the Shire in August 2021, and was the fifth person in the role over six years.

Cr MacCarthy said Mr Dolzadelli's deep finance knowledge and experience in local government had led to many improvements.

Road safety the focus of future town team projects

ASPHALT Art is the latest project that the Donnybrook Town Team is bringing to the community.

As a sub-committee of the Donnybrook CRC and a member of the Town Team Movement of WA, the Donnybrook Town Team (DTT) is focused on engaging and empowering the community to create better places.

An example of the team's success is the Donnybrook Dunny Do Over which saw a mural installed on the toilet block in the centre of the town and officialy opened in February 2023.

DTT is taking proactive steps to ensure the safety of the community near the Apple Fun Park and the Donnybrook Pump Track with their latest project - Asphalt Art.

The creation of artworks on the asphalt is intended to not only calm traffic, but also to inspire everyone who passes by.

There will be two locations for the artwork, near both of the pram ramp crossings on Collins and Reserve streets.

As a road safety initiative, DTT has received grant funding of \$25,000 from RAC.

Team members have started talking with residents who live close to the location and will engage with the broader community.

We plan to involve our younger community by organising workshops to develop a theme for the artwork.

An experienced artist will work with the children taking part in creating the art to ensure the best results.

Painting will take place in April and May 2025, and there will be opportunities for the entire community to participate.

By working together, we can create a safer and more beautiful community for all to enjoy.

A quick step back to celebrate 70 years of ball history

THE Donnybrook Historical Society's 'A Quick Step Back' dance held on Saturday 30 March was both a celebration of past Apple Festival balls and a tribute to former society president Steve Dilley.

The idea for the Donnybrook Historical Society (DHS) to host an event commemorating the first Apple Festival Ball held in 1954, plus subsequent balls, came about in 2021.

In opening the gala event, held at the Donnybrook Soldiers Memorial Hall, DHS president Shaun Nelson said the idea was first discussed when DHS members were on a bus trip for their end-of-year wind-up to the Bridgetown Cidery.

"Steve Dilley, our president at the time, came to chat to a few of us sitting down the back of the bus, and with much excitement, he bought up his idea of recreating a retro ball to celebrate 70 years of Apple Festival balls," Shaun said.

"Steve had spent some time being a judge on panels for the Apple Queen competitions, and being heavily involved in the apple and pear industry, and as a fruit grower himself, as well as attending many festivals and balls, even partnering his wife Rosie when she was an entrant in 1987, we

thought this was a fantastic idea.

"Sadly, in November 2022, Steve passed away, leaving such a big hole in his family and this community, but he also left us with his idea to create this event that he so wanted," he said.

Shaun said some DHS members had made it their mission to host the 70th anniversary event, and he thanked everyone for being part of the night, especially Rosie Dilley.

The night included performances from Brookhampton Bell Ringers and the Bunbury Rock & Roll Club, along with several guest speakers.

Dr Helen Cripps, the daughter of the Department of Agriculture senior research officer John Cripps who bred the pink lady apple, provided an insightful perspective of her father's apple breeding work.

Danielle Nelson, who was an Apple Princess in 2000, shared her experiences of the competition with

several past Apple Queen contestants joining her on stage.

Terri Sharpe, former Apple Festival committee chairperson, also spoke about her past experiences of Apple Festival balls.

The society displayed a large range of Apple Festival memorabilia at the event in the Lesser Hall.

The night was supported by many local businesses and had several fun activities, including a quiz, a lucky door prize, lolly bags and boxes of fruit on each table.

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World class music performances held in Balingup

A STELLAR line up of talent — local and international - opened the 2024 Balingup Arts and Cultural Hub (BACH) program in March and April.

Etheara Collaboration

The Etheara Collaboration performed soaring and evocative world music on Saturday 23 March at the Balingup Town Hall.

In a collaboration between Beth Chia and Chrissy Maddison, both of Balingup, with Gary Maddison on drums and Kip Cameron on Yidaki (Digeridu), Etheara gave the audience an experience of beautifully-constructed and hypnotic world music.

Through the layering of soaring vocals from Beth and Chrissy with keyboards, flute and yidaki, Etheara produced an eclectic mix of ancient and modern sounds inspired by Celtic and indigenous roots.

At times the music was powerful and pulsing, and at other it was soft, ethereal and mystical, but always a satisfying and complete blending of voices and instruments.

The performance opened with travelling troubadour Nick Bannan, an adopted son and favourite of Balingup with vocals on acoustic guitar.

The audience experienced another rich variety of world music, ranging from Spanish to classical, Celtic through to folk.

Show stoppers included Nick's 'a capella' version of the Scottish classic 'Loch Lomond' (you take the high road) and Nick and Chrissy's duet 'Scarborough Fair'.

Opera Divas

Rachelle Durkin and Dimity Shepherd performed a glittering night of opera, with Mark Coughlan on the grand piano, on Saturday 30 March.

Standing ovations occurred throughout the performance by Western Australia's own world opera stars, Rachelle Durkin and Dimity Shepherd and concert pianist Mark Coughlan, marking an historic night in the Balingup Town Hall.

Entitled 'Tell Me Sister!', the beauty and sheer power of the voices of New York Met favourite coloratura soprano Rachelle and Australia's great mezzo soprano Dimity blended to give the capacity audience the musical experience of a lifetime.

Featuring achingly beautiful duets such as the 'Flower Song' from the opera *Lakme*, the 'Norma Duet', the 'Bacarolle' and a show-stopping version of the 'Duet for Two Cats' by Rossini, the divas' performance provided a wide sweep of opera favourites.

Rachelle's solo performance of 'I Could Have Danced All Night' had the entire audience on its feet singing with full gusto, while Dimity's solo of the 'Habanera'

from Carmen revealed the drama and raw passion of this tragic heroine.

Mark Coghlan's solo performance of Gershwin's 'Rhapsody in Blue' was a dazzling display of concert pianist virtuosity, bringing the audience again to its feet in rapturous applause.

Summa Musica

With its ninth concert in Balingup, this superb 'a capella' choir of 12 voices under the expert direction of Anthony Maydwell moved the audience with its sheer beauty of perfect and controlled harmonies on Saturday 6 April.

Summa Musica performed a repertoire of music that bridged the sacred and the profane, from the divine to the outright bawdy.

Featuring works by Eric Whitacre, Henry Purcell, Carlos Guastavino, Rodolfo Halffter and PDQ Bach, the audience was exposed to works of great variety spanning the years 1659 to 2000 AD.

The imaginary heroics of Don Qijote (sung in Spanish), which was a mini opera in its dramatics and storytelling, were juxtaposed with Henry Purcell's bawdy tavern song of the period late 1600s - 'Good Simon How Come Your Nose Looks So Red?'.

A standing ovation was the audience recognition of experiencing an extraordinary evening of music delivered by this most accomplished of choirs.


The 2025 Committee will have a solid foundation to build upon, promising an even more captivating and engaging event for both community members and visitors, while also offering increased benefits for local businesses.


A few doors along is DonnyBooks, which sells a large range of books - new, second-hand, vintage and antique - along with games and gifts.



The month of April has moved quickly, where we saw the Balingup Small Farm Field Day and 'Brook Fest light up our region. Both events proved successful, with the Balingup Small Farm Field Day bringing approximately 4,000 attendees on the day, and 'Brook Fest selling over 200 tickets and handing out over 150 tickets for the event on the day. The Shire commends the efforts of all those involved in each occasion, and we are pleased to share that the feedback from the community (near and far) has been resoundingly positive. Well done to those who made it all happen, it was a fantastic effort.

In other recent developments, the VC Mitchell Park (VCMP) Project has continued to make significant progress in the construction stage, and in recent weeks saw the concrete poured for the second floor of Pavilion 1. The Project is dedicated to the enhancement of the quality of life for Shire residents, and has remained well on track for the delivery of a vital community asset. Pavilion 2 is also well under way, with framing completed and new roof-cover installed.

The Project Consultation Group (PCG) have contributed to the project with discussions ranging from the materials that will be used for flooring and walls, to ideas on how to best join the existing Donnybrook Recreation Centre facilities to the rest of the precinct. BOND STREET & FLEET STREET

Drainage works to commence mid-late May.

SOUTHAMPTON ROAD / SPRING GULLY ROAD

Road upgrade works on a section of the Southampton Rd intersection with Spring Gully Rd. Works will be ongoing throughout May.

PRESTON RIVER LOOP FOOTPATH

Construction works for a new footpath along the Preston River will be ongoing throughout May.

UPPER CAPEL ROAD BRIDGE

Replacement of Bridge 3275 on Upper Capel Rd began as proposed in November 2023.Road closures will be in place at the Upper Capel Rd Bridge for a period of up to six (6) months from the start date, and are anticipated to be removed early June. The full notice and plans, including detour plans, are available to view on the Shire website.

MAINTENANCE GRADING

Due to the prolonged dry season, Summer Maintenance Grading will be ongoing. Please note that this is typically done to remove corrugations and improve the running surface by pushing gravel off the middle section of road - however, this is only ever partially successful. This is due to the lack of moisture in the gravel, and is not good for the overall integrity of our gravel roads. As such, some areas may be ungraded as with insufficient moisture, gravel loosens harder sections of the roads and cannot be recompacted until Winter Grading is done (following suitable rain events).

DONNYBROOK & BALINGUP TOWNSITES

With Autumn comes more fallen leaves, requiring additional sweeping of our townsites. Shire staff and contractors will be undertaking these works during Autumn and Winter months.

Hours of operation are typically between 7:00am and 5:00pm, Monday to Friday.

Works will be clearly signed, and we request that you exercise due care when travelling near or through the designated areas. Delays are expected to be minimal.

RESTRICTED BURNING PERIOD EXTENDED

Due to seasonal conditions, and in consultation with the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions, notice is hereby given pursuant to Section 18 of the Bush Fires Act 1954 (as amended), the Shire of Donnybrook Balingup has extended its Restricted Burning Period until midnight 10 May 2024. Further variations to this date may apply dependent on weather conditions.

As of 11 May, provided that there have been no changes to the dates above, we will be entering the Unrestricted Burning Period. During this time, it's best to prepare your property for the upcoming fire season (particularly if you choose to use fire to reduce the fuel load on your property). Please be aware that, due to the impact of smoke, burning is still prohibited on land under 2000m².

If you are burning during this period, ensure that you have registered the burn with DFES via (08) 9395 9209.





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Economic Contribution Update

Annual Noise, Dust and Water Report Presentations

A presentation was recently delivered to the local community group Grow Greenbushes and the Shire of Bridgetown–Greenbushes, focusing on Talison's performance in noise and dust management for the previous year. Key points included the absence of exceeding regulated limits in the most recent reporting period, alongside an overall increase in Site noise levels attributed to heightened mining activity (i.e. more, and bigger, mining fleet). Dust impacts, particularly noticeable during the dry summer months, were addressed, with information provided about additional monitoring conditions introduced in response to increased Mine throughput. The presentation also covered water management practices, highlighting the use of dams and pit voids for water storage, minimal groundwater usage and extensive monitoring to ensure downstream water quality remains unaffected. The very dry/hot and long 2023/24 summer period has been a very challenging period for Talison with respect to dust management in particular. Talison has significantly increased its real time dust monitoring network over the last 12 months with the aim of being able to better control and manage its dust impacts. A Dust Trigger Action Response Plan (TARP) is now in place which sets out a clear strategy for dust management.













Page Turners explore Greek texts to suit all tastes

EACH month, members of the Donnybrook Page Turners select a theme, rather than a specific book and sometimes this can have surprising results.

Last month's theme, A Taste of Greece, revealed in our readers multiple connections to many things Greek.

One member's sister, married to an Australian whose family is Greek, had co-edited a book of recipes, A Taste of Greece, by the Perth Hellenic Women's Community.

This recipe book was particularly notable, as for the first time, the recipes included actual measurements for ingredients.

Usually these 'handed-down' recipes were "a bit or this and bit of that" - all family 'secrets'!

Philoxenia, A Seat At My Table, written by Kon and Sia Darapanagiotidis, is a new vegan and vegtarian cookbook published in 2023, and in which Kon writes a lot about his daily kitchen life in Greece.

The book is a celebration of growing and making your own food, of living sustainably, and of eating food that nurtures your body. It is a book with community at its centre.

Another cookbook selected was Greek and Middle Eastern Cookery, edited by Donna Hay in 1992.

Used mainly for two staple recipes, the real story behind this book was that the Page Turners' member was fed by Donna Hay when they were both studying at East Sydney Technical College.

Another member recalled her very long-standing Greek connections - she had long forgotten that her friends were "Greek", being simply friends in her mind.

The recent, living-memory history of Perth, and indeed Australia, post-WW2, came to life as connections and places where long friendships with Greek-Australians were shared.

Other Greek tastes included Maeve Binchy's Nights of Rain and Stars, which brought back memories of that member's visit to Greece, as her holiday setting is mirrored in this book.

Louis de Bernieres' Captain Corelli's Mandolin, set on a Greek island during World War II, was felt to be too prosy compared to the movie.

The Time-Life book, Classic Greeks, is a distillation of Hellenism showing Greece in all its dewy freshness.

In picture essays, it documents various aspects of the Greek experience to satisfy even the most assiduous reader of books on Greece.

Costa's World by Costa Georgiadis, the Greek-Australian landscape architect and ABC television presenter, covers a lot of topics including sustainability and permaculture.

As the member said about the book, it is a little bit like Costa himself - all over the place!

Talking to My Daughter About the Economy, by Yanis Varoufakis, is a very readable, if sometimes challenging book.

Sub-titled 'How Capitalism Works, and How it Fails', the book is written by a world-renowned economist who was the Greek finance minister during the Greek financial crisis of 2014 - 15.

Aphrodite's Breath, by Susan Johnson, is the memoir of a writer diagnosed with cancer who moves to a Greek island with her mother.

Unfortunately, her mother is constantly and consistently negative about everything on and about the island.

Nevertheless, the book has beautiful description of Kythera island and its different seasons, historical facts of the several places that she visited, the life and folklore of its inhabitants and the delicious food of course, with glimpses of subtle humour.

The Rabbit Hunter: The Battle of Greece, written by New Zealander Christopher Worth and published in March 2023, is a story set in Greece in April 1941 when the Greek armies were pushing back Mussolini's invading armies.

Hitler's Wehrmacht was looking to come to the aid of the Italians, as allies of Greece, New Zealand, Australian, and British forces were deployed to engage the Germans.

The characters are fictional, covering the actions of a platoon of New Zealand infantry and their involvement in the Greek nation's unfolding disaster as the Battle of Greece was a military failure.

This gripping story follows young farmers, mechanics, teachers and labourers from the bottom of the world, in their first encounters with a vastly more experienced enemy.

The book realistically portrays terror, tragedy, farce, and humour as the Battle for Greece becomes a desperate battle for survival.

At the same time, new technology has allowed the creation of a new independent, community driven media like WOW and DBCR.

As part of that show, Shauna interviewed Karen Lambeck from Karrabilli Eats about the opening of her new commercial kitchen in Yabberup.

A good example of how the independent media is working is the conversation we had with Lee-ann Dimasi prior to the opening of SHAG Brewing Company cidery, on the day of the Apple Festival.

Lee-ann shared the interview on her social media and it was played over 1000 times.

We also broadcasted talks presented at Future Farming Voices at the Apple Festival.

Barb Howard, the chair of Certified Organic Biodynamic WA (COBWA) spoke about the aims of the organisation, as well as Jill Griffiths, author of What's for Dinner, a book that looks at what has



happened to the control of food in the last 40 years. Another talk was by local organic orchardist and Pome West chair Jason Jarvis. Sue Chapman, from Voices for Forrest, joined the show to explain to our listeners how this new community democracy movement is working and how people can get involved.

We also welcomed shire president Viv MacCarthy to explain resolutions of the Donnybrook-Balingup Shire Council meeting, while deputy shire president Lisa Glover highlighted agenda items before the next council meeting.

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Bird characteristics and antics intrigue U3A members

MEMBERS of the Donnybrook U3A were fascinated by our April guest speaker, John Frings, ably assisted by his wife Lynn, on the topic of recognising birds.

John and Lynn were previously registered wildlife carers which they ran from their home in Mandurah.

Their aim was to release all birds and EASTERN OR WES animals back to the Photo: Susan Muir wild, and if this was

not possible then euthanasia would be carried out by a vet.

There were some sad moments, such as a kestrel which turned out to have epilepsy, which is highly unusual, and had to be euthanised.

Then there was the brilliant story of an eagle which had a stainless-steel hypodermic needle inserted by a vet to repair its wing.

The operation was very successful and the wing turned out stronger than the other wing!

Often, John and Lynn had eggs or tiny hatchlings brought to them, and to be able to care for the bird, John had to first determine what it was so that the correct foods could be given, or in the case of eggs, at what temperature to be incubated.

Food for the birds was based on working out which bacteria was needed – quite a science!

John could also tell the difference between birds of prey and parrots identifying them by their smell.

He has been interested in birds since a young age.

A tawny frogmouth, often mistaken for an owl, is a nocturnal bird and is a master of camouflage that can blend in with tree branches.

They eat mostly insects and are a lazy bird which waits for their prey to pass by.

Sometimes they are mistakenly called "mopokes" or "mopawks", which is a name also used for the Australian boobook owl.

John and Lynn use many methods for identifying some of the small bundles of fluff which are brought to them for care.

Their hooked beaks, their ears, feather colourings, or tunnels in nostrils, which is a unique characteristic of a falcon which slows down the air so the bird can breathe normally at high speeds.

Honeyeaters have a brush tipped tongue like a paintbrush.

Is it a '28' or Port Lincoln parrot? The difference is the Port Lincoln has a ring around its neck.

What about galahs — western or eastern? The eastern has a pinker chest.

Is it a 'welcome swallow' or 'tree martin'? One has a split tail; one has a fan tail.

The goshawk is indentified by the bone above its eye, which protects it

when diving through trees to get prey.

John said certain birds had to be declared and released back to where they came from, such as the peregrine falcon which is on the endangered list.

Silvereyes were easy enough to release in the back garden as a common bird.

Releasing magpies back in to the wild was a challenge, as magpies live in colonies of about a dozen, and if others are released nearby, they will kill them.

There are seven genres of magpies and they have different colourings, while a baby magpie has blue eyes and an adult has brown.

John had to go fishing to feed any baby pelicans, which look like a little ball of wool when young.

Pelicans are not allowed to be ringed, so John would paint a number on their back before releasing them. He has also helped a lot of pelicans by removing fishhooks.

John had many more tales of the characters of the birds in their care, such as the pecking order of the leader, second in command, and the shy comic.

The unusual antics of the wild birds around the rehabilitation cages saw a wild kookaburra feeding a baby through the cage and when that was full, as birds only eat until full, it proceeded to feed the magpie in the cage next door!

In focus – diagnostic photography



Head front and lateral views of an exotic black imported fire ant (Solenopsis richteri) worker, focus stacked with a stereomicroscope and dedicated high-resolution digital camera.

Imaging technologies have evolved significantly over the past decade in terms of image resolution, quality, and magnification. It's easy to observe these changes just by looking at the continuous advancements in digital cameras and mobile phones. Less apparent to many is the progress made in macro and micro photography, significantly enhancing the ability to identify invertebrates, fungi, bacteria, and other subjects.

Modern software has evolved too. One such development is a process called 'focus stacking'. Multiple images, focused at different distances are combined, or 'stacked' to form a single, fully focused image. The images featured in this article were produced through focus stacking, making complex diagnostic features easily identifiable.

Our subject

The ant photographed is about 3 mm in length. This species is not present in Australia and is of biosecurity concern. To identify this species, diagnosticians (aka taxonomists) need to be able to see its microscopic features, which include a 2-segmented waist and 10-segmented antennae, with the last 2 segments forming a distinct club.

To get a bit more technical, a characteristic seen only among the 2 species of imported fire ant, is the median tooth centred along the front edge of the clypeus, which is flanked by 2 lateral teeth. The clypeus is one of the plates that form the "face" of an insect.

The digital advantage

Having digital reference material provides so many advantages. Photographing living specimens prior to curation allows for the full colour spectrum of a species to be captured and permanently recorded. Preserved specimens can lose their colours over time, for example, the eye colour of dragonflies and fruit flies fade shortly after they die.

Diagnostic imaging can facilitate fast-tracked identification as photos may be shared directly with specialists across the globe. This is particularly useful when local experts are not available or further verification is required. Utilising diagnostic photos also reduces the need to send specimens and helps safeguard them from damage and loss.

When communicating about the various pests or diseases that are present in WA or highlighting those to look out for, being able to show them in the environment, and the damage they cause is essential. Our department's imaging specialist helps to do this by creating high-quality digital products. Many of which are available on the Pest and Disease Image Library (padil.gov.au) and are featured on our website and communication products like posters, factsheets, and videos.

Acute water stress causes canopy collapse

OVER the past months, the Leschenault Biosecurity Group (LBG) has fielded several enquiries regarding canopy decline and the probable cause being insect and/or disease related mortality.

The group advises the South West does have numerous insects that cause significant morbidity in trees such as the Longicorn Beetle, Psyllid Lerp and recently the Polyphagous Shot Hole Borer in Perth, which has lead to arborists culling hundreds of iconic deciduous trees.

Similarly, diseases such as Armillaria and Phytophthora root fungus lead to significant tree death.

The recent canopy collapse, however, is directly related to water stress.

A tree that dies with its foliage attached to the branches, albeit brown, is acute water stress and is relatively sudden.

Tress and/or shrubs with a shallow root profile such as those in the upper catchment in creek lines where soil has been washed down the slope, exposing granite outcrops or jarrah colonising lateritic ridge lines are most susceptible.

Further, members of the Proteaceae family such as Banksias, with fibroid root systems which are fine and shallow, are dropping out of the landscape from Carnarvon to Esperance.

To be clear, this vegetation cohort is unlikely to survive, but some may coppice from the basal stem, creating a multi stem (mallee form) structure.

Insect and or disease is secondary to the primary cause of vegetation mortality.

It would be unwise to label the 2023-2024 summer as directly related to human-induced climate change, but rather diminishing rainfall in the South West has led to a lower resilience of the forest ecosystem over time.

In the last two years, the shire has experienced a 600mm deficit in rainfall average, against a 30% decreasing trend since the 1970s which has been linked to climate change.

Do you have a wildlife first aid kit in your car?

WHEN organising a wildlife first aid kit for your car, initially it doesn't have to have everything that is recommended, but choosing a few essentials could save a life, and lots of distress and suffering.

Even at home it would be handy to have items close at hand instead of rushing around like a mad thing, as I do, trying to locate a torch or a box that hopefully wasn't discarded to the recycling bin.

• A torch.

You can use your phone, but a decent torch is more efficient especially if you are on your own.

• A printed list of telephone numbers to call for advice.

Not every occasion is the same, so experienced guidance and reassurance can mean the difference to your safety, as well as the animals.

Telephone numbers to include in your kit are:

It won't help you on every occasion, sometimes we just have to improvise, but it does help to be prepared.

One of my recent orphaned brushtail possums was picked up by a lady walking her dog.

Fortunately, the dog was on a leash because the little joey decided that her leg looked like a very good place to take refuge and ran up it.

This quick-thinking lady wrapped the joey tightly in her t-shirt and called the Wildcare Helpline for advice.

As most rescues happen while we are driving, we need a few essentials on hand. A basic first aid kit could include:

• a box, a pet carrier or a plastic container.

A box will suffice on most occasions, but it needs to be closed up so that the animal doesn't escape.

Some masking tape would be needed as well. If using a plastic container, drill air holes into the lid and sides.

• A towel and a small blanket.

Use the towel to throw over and wrap the animal. It is essential to cover the animal's face, as this stops you from being bitten and calms the animal.

Do not handle the animal any more than necessary, and place it into the container with the towel to add warmth and place the blanket over to keep it dark. Please turn off the radio and keep the space as quiet as possible.

You don't need to place water or food in the box.

Gloves.

Stressed animals can try to get away or fight back, so use gloves to prevent being bitten or injured by very sharp claws or beaks.

Once you have put these items together in your wildlife first aid kit, you can start adding other useful items.

Other items could include a fluorescent vest, pouch or pillowcase, disposable gloves, a face mask, protective glasses, antiseptic wipes or handwash, scissors, pliers, and a heat pack.

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
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
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Donnybrook tennis season has smashing finish
